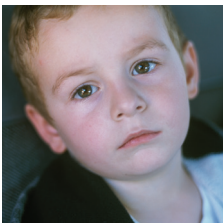
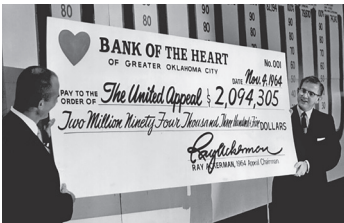

Together, our commitment to a healthy quality of life will continue tomorrow and for the next 100 years to come. Because of you.

It's because of you that we can share the gift of life for 100 years and more. Without you, United Way of Central Oklahoma, United Way of Canadian County and United Way of Logan County would not be stable resources to more than 70 Partner Agencies. Without you, our Partner Agencies would not be able to serve our neighbors with life-changing programs.

The past 100 years built us in strength, in collaboration, but most of all, in compassion. Our Partner Agencies have always been a tight-knit family, working together to tackle some of our community's most challenging health and human services issues. We are proud to also note we added a brand new agency in The CARE Center to our ever-expanding network in addition to three new programs funded by our fourth-annual **WayFinder Innovation Grant**. Since 2019, 13 unique programs have emerged from area nonprofits to solve stubborn health and human services issues in our community. Including this year's WayFinder recipients, \$882,000 has been committed to the initiative.

2022 also brought us immense gratitude for completely returning to in-person celebrations.

We are incredibly grateful for the support of our 2022 Pacesetter companies for raising \$3.3 million. Our Pacesetters always give us the leg-up we need when kicking off our campaign. We had the best time celebrating their dedication at the second annual **The Hole Shebang!**, which also served as our Campaign Kickoff, raising nearly \$30,000. Chesapeake Energy dethroned Duncan Oil Properties, Inc. for the Cornhole Cup in our corporate cornhole tournament.

Under the superb leadership of Shane and Lori Wharton, \$19 million was raised to support more than 100 programs that provide the gift of hope to our neighbors who need it most. Our 2022 Campaign would not have been as 'rockin' without the addition of 2,731 new donors who contributed \$552,714 new dollars to our campaign.

Our donors, volunteers and Partner Agencies have our most sincere thanks. With your endless support, we know we'll successfully serve this community for 100 years more.

The **Strategic Growth Committee** oversees the business model that produces the resources required for United Way of Central Oklahoma to achieve its work. The Strategic Growth Committee reviews, evaluates and develops methods to secure adequate resources for the United Way of Central Oklahoma through its annual campaign, capital campaigns, planned giving, grants and endowment programs. The committee provides strategic direction and a framework to support the Campaign Chairs and the staff’s annual and longer-term fundraising efforts.

In 2022, planning began for a community-wide brand survey to identify United Way of Central Oklahoma’s local perception. The survey will be launched in spring 2023, and the results will be used to guide Strategic Growth initiatives for many years to come.

Donor-Directed Donations are funds directed by donors to a specific Partner Agency or program – offering a unique opportunity to assist with investing in solutions to our community’s most pressing needs. 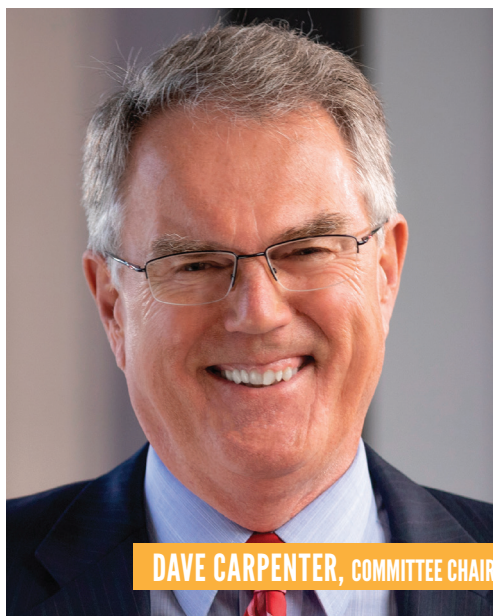

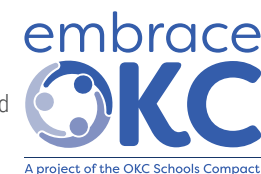

COMMUNITY INVESTMENT

The Community Investment Committee provides direction and oversight to the annual Community Investment process. Through reviewing subcommittee findings and funding recommendations, the committee determines allocable dollars for each Partner Agency program.

In 2022, the Community Investment Committee evaluated applications for new Partner Agencies. Following a thorough review of applicants, we were thrilled to welcome The CARE Center to our Partner Agency network in September.

The CARE Center is Oklahoma County's only child advocacy center and provides education and healing services to thousands of children and families affected by child abuse



United Way is committed to integrity, accountability, transparency and excellence in all aspects of our work. Upholding the trust of our donors and community to responsibly allocate and manage donations is a duty we take very seriously.

Driven by our core values, United Way of Central Oklahoma continually exceeds the United Way Worldwide Standards of Excellence and is consistently ranked as a Four Star Charity by Charity Navigator. We strive to maintain low administrative and fundraising costs, and we hold our Partner Agencies to those same standards.

Each year, our Partner Agencies renew their association with United Way through the Community Investment process. This process is administered by our board and donor volunteers. Partner Agencies and their programs are closely analyzed to ensure that contributions are allocated to only those nonprofits that uphold the highest standards of excellence.

The following outlines the steps of the [Community Investment process](#), and you'll be able to see exactly where your donations were allocated on the next pages.

- 1** United Way of Central Oklahoma **raises funds**.
- 2** Approximately 200 donor volunteers spend over **5,000 combined hours reviewing** agency applications, budgets, audits, financials, performance histories and program outcomes. Current research about health and human service needs also informs the review.
- 3** Volunteers **visit Partner Agencies** to see firsthand the work accomplished with United Way funds.
- 4** Volunteers meet **to discuss funding recommendations** for each program under consideration.
- 5** The Community Investment Committee, made up of board members, reviews and **balances funding recommendations** from the volunteers to the funds available for allocation.
- 6** When the funding balance is complete, the Community Investment Committee **submits a final recommendation** to United Way's board for approval.
- 7** Following approval, **funds are distributed** among our Partner Agencies.
- 8** Volunteers conduct **follow-up evaluations** through reports on results achieved.

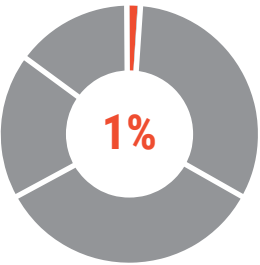
